

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

soho

To say it has been a challenging year for our organization, and for SOHO's girls and their families, is an understatement. At the onset of the pandemic, in-person programming ceased abruptly. Our staff started working from home, virtual art and science classes were developed, and we pivoted to provide emergency support to families. Despite many difficulties, it has been a year of learning, organizational growth, and deepening relationships—driven by necessity and informed by trial and error.

Ensuring that our girls are emotionally secure and socially connected has always been our top priority; postpandemic, these goals have become even more important and urgent. For the first time since our program started in 2002, we observed among our girls a decrease in developmental assets, the essentials that children need to be successful, which include support by non-parent caring adults, constructive use of out-of-school time, positive identity, and social competencies. What does this indicate? Despite numerous interventions, the impacts of the pandemic and associated public health measures are simply overwhelming.

Our findings reveal uncomfortable truths about vulnerable young people's prospects in this difficult time and they also teach us that SOHO programming must be more creative and stronger than ever to help our girls navigate so many challenges. We take both these findings to heart. As schools' doors remain closed in Alexandria, we continue to develop and deliver engaging programming, provide essential family support services and build organizational capacity. With constant refinement and unwavering effort, we believe we are slowly beginning to stem the tide.

In partnership with MENTOR Virginia, we are re-imagining how best to provide services moving forward by participating in the National Quality Mentoring System organizational improvement process. We are revamping our mentor recruitment strategy to increase diversity among our volunteers and developing a system for rematching girls and mentors to strengthen program continuity. We are also refining our visual arts and STEM projects and developing a wellness program. Our signature space transformations, which have occurred in each girl's home for nearly 20 years, are being re-considered. Moving forward, we may pivot to support and empower families to spruce up their own homes.

Our donors and volunteers continue to be essential to all our work. You pivoted with us as we made the decision to shift towards emergency support; you've continued to encourage these efforts, which remain essential, and we are grateful beyond measure. We cannot wait for in-person SOHO meetings to resume, to recruit 26 new fifth graders and 26 new mentors to join our sisterhood, to fully reactivate our long-time partnerships with the likes of Alexandria City Public Schools and The Art League, and build on our new partnerships with organizations like Building Momentum and Sleep in Heavenly Peace. We hope to see your smiling faces at SOHO this year and welcome you to visit!

Stepped up to start a STEM-based mentoring program for boys, DECOL is SOHO's new partner program.



Odal<mark>l</mark>s Honored with 2019 Points of Ligh<mark>t</mark> Award

After contracting the COVID-19 virus last December and being extremely ill for three weeks, Odalis Delcid (19) is grateful to be alive. She is back at work at Target and attending Northern Virginia Community College, where she is working toward a degree in criminal justice. Her mentor, Lisette Torres, has been a tremendous support.

"Lisette helped me find myself. She really listened, she understood my perspective and shared her perspective. She's like an older sister I can talk to." Having experienced major childhood trauma, Odalis struggled as a ninth grader and was on a path toward dropping out of school. Lisette "pulled me up and helped me." She convinced Odalis to become the first youth representative with Alexandria's Campaign on Adolescent Pregnancy, where she has been a leader in bringing sex education and mental health awareness to youth. For this volunteer work, which exceeded 100 hours of service to the community, Odalis was honored with a 2019 Points of Light Award. "I am so grateful and happy that Lisette was there when I was in a dark place in my life. She broke my shell. Lisette has given me so many opportunities and I have met so many people."

Mentor Lisette Torres shared the impact Odalis has had on her, "Being Odalis' mentor has been one of my greatest honors. Odalis shared with me that I helped her grow as a person, but the feeling is mutual. She has taught me so much about resilience and courage. Odalis has faced a lot of hard situations in life, but what I admire most about her is the bravery she has exhibited by sharing her story to bring hope and healing to others facing similar challenges. Through it all, she never lost her caring personality and kind heart. Odalis will always be a special person in my life. I had the opportunity to transform Odalis' room, but it was Odalis who changed and transformed me."

Jenny appreciates Erika's mentorship and having "another person to give me advice--mature advice-- about life situations." Jenny credits Erika for giving her the courage to try things outside of her comfort-zone. "I had a fear of speaking in front of a group and I feel like I can do anything when I am with Erika." The two have presented at mentor recruitment events, at a grant award luncheon with the Rotary Club at Belle Haven Country Club, and on Fox 5 News for Mentoring Monday.

Jenny takes on tremendous responsibility to ensure the well-being of her mother and two younger brothers, one of whom is severely disabled. She schedules doctors' appointments and school meetings and helps to pay the bills. The first in her family to attend college, Jenny is considering a career in nursing, business or special education. She began attending Northern Virginia Community College last fall and aspires to transfer to a four-year university. SOHO recently nominated Jenny for a "Beat the Odds" college scholarship.

Jenny paid for her own braces and is now saving to buy a car. "I'm getting my permit in February. Watch out, I'll be on the road soon!"

Diplomatic Security Officer with the U.S. Department of State, Mirinda Haynes, is now in a position to give back. Her life has soared since joining SOHO 16 years ago. Mirinda appreciates SOHO, particularly her mentor, Jennifer Tutuska, for helping to motivate her. "My mentor Jenn was there for me after my mom died and she is here for me to this day. She has always listened and helped me to understand things and stay focused on my priorities."

Jenn transformed Mirinda's childhood bedroom—a memory that Miranda still shares with others. Then, after high school graduation, Jenn helped Mirinda pack for college, decorate her dorm room in Richmond, and then move her into her D.C. apartment after she earned her degree. The two meet up regularly to just sit and talk. Jenn is an avid traveler, which has influenced Mirinda to try and see the world. Last October Mirinda celebrated her 27th birthday with a trip to Los Angeles and Long Beach, California. She hopes to visit Puerto Rico next.

When she became a mentor, Jenn Tutuska did not anticipate what a strong role Mirinda would play in her life over the course of 15 years. Jenn admires Mirinda's gentle and kind heart, her work ethic, perseverance, and girl power. "Mirinda is an inspiration to any young or grown woman who crosses her path."

Mirinda graduated from Virginia Union University in 2017 with a BA in Criminal Justice and Criminology. In addition to her current career, which has provided her with a top security clearance and great potential for advancement, Mirinda is a budding entrepreneur. She started her own small business, New Creations, making and selling body butters, body scrubs, face washes, and gift baskets,

Mirinda is paying it forward to SOHO, providing supplies and teaching young participants how to make body scrubs. Her goal is to inspire the girls to stay focused, communicate with their mentors, aim high, and perhaps start their own businesses.

Jenny Martinez and her mentor, Erika Stratmann, were matched eight years ago when they joined SOHO. The two hit it off and have maintained a solid relationship throughout the years, spending quality time together and celebrating each other's milestones. Jenny's fondest SOHO memory is of the program's kick-off camping trip, where she met Erika. Jenny had never been away from home overnight, not even for a sleepover.

Over the years, Jenny and Erika have shared memorable experiences, such as ice skating, playing mini golf, attending a Washington Spirit soccer game and visiting Baltimore's National Aquarium. Jenny's first time seeing the ocean was with Erika.

For Erika, who had recently moved to Alexandria prior to joining SOHO, Jenny "helped connect me to this community... [she] is very caring and naturally wants to help people." Erika is grateful to have had Jenny in her life as she got married and had children, adding, "Jenny is my SOHO sister." "I had never been to a wedding before," Jenny shared, "It was so special."


PROGRAM INCOME



VOLUNTEERS

Our outstanding volunteer mentors pivoted with us during this pandemic, attending group Zoom meetings and connecting one-on-one with their mentees via phone, Facetime and, with their masks on, during socially distanced walks. They helped girls with homework, picked up and delivered supplies, and served as social workers to identify family needs and help connect them with services. They attended programmatic brain-storming sessions, participated in mentor training and support sessions, helped with STEM curriculum development, and initiated a book club. Many mentors raised and donated funds to support our girls and families. Their patience and tenacity are remarkable.
